Candidates will be asked to produce a linguistic analysis for each Learning Outcome on prerecorded two-way discussions in BSL. The candidate will be expected to discuss the different elements of linguistics used in the discussion.

Notes

- The pre-recorded discussions can be either:
- the candidate's own evidence clip that could also be used for BSL421 and/or BSL422

 OR
- chosen by the centre
- A different clip must be used for each part (1 to 4). Candidates can use more than one clip for each part if necessary.
- Each clip must be at least 5 minutes in length.

The teacher-assessor should fill in the relevant Candidate Assessment Record (CAR) Form(s) for these sections to show which assessment criteria has been met.

Part 5

Assessment for Part 5 will take the form of a 60 minute written question paper based on the content of this unit.

This will be externally marked by Signature.

The pass mark for Part 5 is 75%.

The evidence collected for parts 1 to 4 will be internally assessed by appropriately qualified staff at the centre and externally moderated by Signature. The CAR forms that show candidates have achieved parts 1 to 4 must be returned to Signature, at the same time as sending Part 5 to Signature for marking.
